2014 Budget Approved

The 2014 Roeland Park budget was passed on August 12, which was primarily focused on planning for the loss of Wal-Mart in 2015 and 2016. As you may be aware the budget included a mix of budget cuts and a property tax increase of about \$118 per year (or near \$10 per month) for the average Roeland Park homeowner.

As part of this year's budget process, hundreds of residents participated in the City's Town Hall meetings, a dozen Council and Committee meetings, the Citizens Satisfaction Survey, and/or emails to his or her elected officials. The Governing Body arrived at this budget after months of review. Discussions which started on April 22, 2013, a week after the new members of the governing body were sworn into office. Strongly affecting the City's sales tax generation is Wal-Mart's pending move to Mission for a larger site. Revenue which is currently generated by sales at Wal-Mart will stop when they move (tentatively scheduled to occur in March 2015). At this point, the City is estimating a two year loss of sales tax from that location and some residual losses from surrounding businesses while the site is being re-tenanted. With this in mind, many cuts in service were discussed and some were taken, with a property tax increase agreed upon by the Council.

The goal with this increase and forecasting for the next three years of City income and expenditures was to attempt to hold the 2014 mill rate, at the same or near the same levels in 2015 and 2016. The council is planning for the loss of sales tax revenue in order to reduce or eliminate the need

for drastic cuts and/or an even higher mill levy in the future.

The tough question was what to prioritize and how much to cut vs. what elements are perceived as cost-effective and worthwhile to keep to maintain the City's quality of life.

The following are some of the **budget cuts** agreed upon for the **2014 budget**:

- ◆ The Deputy Chief position will be left open for at least two years. If the new Chief reports that he believes the cut is not sustainable after seeing it in effect, the Governing Body will reconsider this cut (the annual savings in 2014 and 2015 were figured at \$100,000 per year).

A few of the smaller reductions from the 2014 budget include:

- ◆ Council Training Total: \$2,250 (Cut \$2,250, 50% cut)
- ◆ Community Events Total: \$2,500 (Cut \$2,000, nearly a 50% cut, leaving only funds for Roeland Park's share of the annual fireworks display with Westwood and Fairway)
- ◆ Cut one police vehicle, leaving the purchase of one police vehicle in 2014: (Cut \$28,000, 50% cut)

One significant investment in the 2014 budget is Street Maintenance:

- ◆ \$230,000 is included in the 2014 budget for Street Maintenance (approximately \$80,000 for in-house repairs and \$150,000 for contract surface street work). The City is trying new surface street techniques, such as "micro-surfacing" chip seal, and crack seal to extend the life of a street before a more expensive mill and overlay is necessary.

Roeland Park Welcomes Google Fiber

Since the announcement that Kansas City would be receiving Google into their community, several council members and City staff have received questions about Google coming to Roeland Park. After months of negotiations, the City Council has approved the document necessary allowing Google Fiber to expand in Roeland Park as part of their future fiber deployments to residential homes.

While no time line has been set by Google for providing services in Roeland Park, residents interested in their services should contact Google at google.com/fiber or attend an information session to experience the Google product first-hand on Tuesday, October 22nd at the Google Fiber Space, 1814 Westport Rd, Kansas City, MO. Sales Tax Mail Ballot Info

On December 10, Roeland Park residents will have the opportunity to vote on a proposed 0.35 percent sales tax increase to help fill the revenue that will be lost with the move of Wal-Mart out of the City to a larger site.

The proposed sales tax is expected to generate approximately \$288,000 a year and will help to offset the estimated \$700,000 in sales tax loss from Wal-Mart and surrounding businesses as a result of Wal-Mart's relocation. The City Council is discussing the proposed use, including options to dedicate the proposed sales tax funds to reduction of the property tax rate and/or restoration of City services.



New Councilmember Teresa Kelly Looks to Embrace Sustainability

It wasn't long after Teresa Kelly and her family moved to Roeland Park about four years ago that the new representative of Ward 4 on the City Council dove head first into policy work. She quickly became involved with a group working to pass an ordinance allowing residents to raise chickens in their back yard. "We worked

with the City council for several months, and we were eventually able to get a great backyard hen ordinance approved," Kelly said.

Since her election in April, Kelly has taken the same fast-start approach to her seat on the Council. "One of the things they talk about with the president and vice president is the first 100 days in office," she said. "I feel like we've really hit the ground running."

Kelly, whose extensive background in sustainability includes working at Cultivate Kansas City and serving on the City's Sustainability Committee, hopes to apply similar principles during her term.

"I really want to see Roeland Park embrace sustainability," she said. "We need to really encourage sustainable business, sustainable buildings, and sustainable living practices."

Kelly also says she intends to work to spread the word about Roeland Park around the metropolitan area.

"I think Roeland Park is Johnson County's best-kept secret," she said. "We've got a wonderful neighborhood feel, it's close to downtown Kansas City, and it's a vibrant, welcoming community. It's our goal to make that a widely-known image."

Ballots will be mailed to registered voters around November 19 and residents can either mail back their ballot or deliver it to the Johnson County Election Commission by December 10.

During the 2014 budget process, the City Council received feedback through a citizen survey and two town hall events, residents wanted to see a balanced approach to the budget. For example, a combination of spending cuts, a property tax increase and a sales tax increase to solve the challenges that will arise when Wal-Mart relocates in 2015.

Starting in 2014 the Governing Body will cut \$132,250 in current City services, including eliminating the purchase of one police vehicle, not filling the soon to be vacant Deputy Chief of Police position, and reducing the community events budget.

Additionally, the City Council raised the property tax to make up for much of the remaining sales tax losses.

Because a property tax is only paid by the residents and businesses within the City, the Governing Body also wanted to look at the option of sharing costs of City services with individuals who shop in Roeland Park but may not live here.

Approximately 40 percent of the sales taxes paid in Roeland Park are generated from consumers who live outside the City. Therefore, if a .35% sales tax is adopted, then individuals who currently use City roads (which are largely funded from sales taxes) and police services (also partly funded from sales taxes) would be contributing to covering the cost of providing these services. Since the estimated loss of \$700,000 is in the form of sales taxes, an increase would help maintain the funding mix between

the cost of services covered by residents through property taxes and non-residents through sales taxes.

Profile: Dave Mootz, Director of Public Works

Dave Mootz began his career with the City of Roeland Park at the age of eighteen. A native of Roeland Park, Mootz started out as summer help in the department of Public Works. He is now director of that department. "I worked over the summer, and lucked into a full-time job," Mootz said. "Then about three years ago, I became the Public Works Director."

Mootz has two sons, 19 and 15, with his wife Debbie who is Roeland Park's City Clerk. He manages a six-man crew and is responsible for the upkeep of all the City's parks and streets.

"Our joke is, we're jacks of all trades, but the master of none," said Mootz, who not only has administrative duties, but works in the field as well. "I like to be out there getting my hands dirty, but I do enjoy the administrative side."

By having a dual-role director like Mootz, the City is able to save taxpayers money. However, maintaining roads and parks is a big job for such a small crew. "Right now, we're trying to keep the same level of service for the City with one less employee," he said. One way Mootz addresses this problem is by outsourcing the grass mowing on City property to contractors. He says that strategy has been effective so far. "That's really allowed us to have a greater focus on street maintenance," Mootz said, adding that he would like to bring as much work back in-house as possible. "We'd ideally like to get to the point where we aren't contracting anything out."

Mootz also mentioned the friendly relationship between his crew members. "The guys that work here are like a family," he said. "We're a real close-knit group of friends, and that's what I like about it."

LIGHTEN UP

As most people are aware, with the change in daylight savings time it is getting dark earlier. Busy schedules do not allow time to walk, ride or run during daylight hours, and many of our neighbors are out walking and riding bikes at the usual time, but now it is dark.



Extensive research has established that well designed reflective clothing can increase your recognition by motorists 75%-100% compared to non-reflective clothing. Reflective materials such as tape or clothing, highlight movements as well as silhouettes of bicyclists, pedestrians and runners. Clear definitions of direction and rate of travel give drivers up to three times more time and distance to react to your presence and to avoid collisions.

Everyone who uses the road or walks at night should wear some type of reflective clothing in order to communicate more effectively with motorists, increase their visibility, and avoid accidents. The most effective safety clothing has reflective tape on the arms and wrists that will display a movement pattern. When these features are not included, night-time visibility to motorists and your

safety are greatly diminished.

Just about every sporting goods store or department store offers this type of safety clothing. Please use it for your own benefit and for all who use Roeland Park streets. Be careful out there!

DANGERS OF SOCIAL NETWORKING SITES

Posting photos on social networking sites like Facebook and Twitter is a quick and easy way to show friends and family what you've been up to. Those innocent snapshots could be revealing a lot more about your life than you think, potentially putting your home and family at risk. The first day of school, a big birthday, or a romantic stroll in the park are all memories you want to preserve and share with friends and family, but experts warn there may be a hidden danger contained in some of the photos you're putting online - a geo-tag. A geo-tag contains specific details like the time and date the photo was taken, along with the exact location of where it was taken. The location can be as accurate as one meter. Every smart phone out there now has a GPS built into it, so it has become very prevalent to geo-tag photos.



With a geo-tagged photo, someone can find out where you live, where your children go to school, and your daily routine. For example, you post a picture of your nice, brand new 50-inch plasma TV at your house, and you are now sharing the location of that TV. An hour later, you are posting that your plane is delayed or posting a picture of your kids playing at the park. Now someone knows where you live, what TV you have and that you are not home. In addition to burglaries, experts say geo-tagged photos can also lead to stalking and domestic violence.

To protect yourself, ensure the privacy settings on your social networks are set on private or "friends only" and turn off the GPS feature for pictures on your phone (check your phone's instruction manual to determine how to turn off geo-tagging or location services). Do not post your travel plans on Facebook, Twitter, or any other social media. Know who your "friends" are and who you are allowing to see your posts, photos, and other personal information.

Leaf Pick Up Schedule

The City will conduct its Annual Fall Leaf Pickup during the months of October, November and December. These dates are tentative providing that the leaves have fallen and weather conditions allow for pickup. ***Please do not place leaves out more than two days prior to your scheduled week.***

Houses on Roe Blvd: The outside lanes of Roe Blvd will be blocked starting at 7:00 am to allow residents to push their leaves into the street. Last pickup will be completed by noon.

Leaves need to be raked into the street about a foot from the curb so the machine can get in and pick them up. Make sure that no foreign objects are raked into the leaves, as they can damage the machine and cause unnecessary expense to the City and to you, the taxpayer.

Update from the Mayor's Desk
on Two Roeland Park Vacant
Properties



Development is going on all around us. Mission's Gateway project has finally begun and Westwood just opened its

new Wal-Mart Neighborhood Market (which is a great achievement for the 47th and Mission Overlay District). With our budget concerns and the obvious underutilized "green spaces" in Roeland Park, many continue to ask what we can do to make use of these properties. The following is generally where we are on two of them:

Northeast Roe and Johnson

Ideally, we would wait for and follow the results of our city-wide Strategic Planning process, which is being planned; however, we believe it is important to begin work on the northeast Roe and Johnson properties at this time. Due to the modification of this intersection from a cloverleaf to a regular intersection, different parts of this site are owned by three cities, with the majority owned by Roeland Park (1.7 acres, north-central) with smaller portions by Mission (0.95 acre, south) and Fairway (0.5 acre, the east end). Our Comprehensive Plan and Mission's Gateway Plan both show making full use of this site by building across the existing City property lines.

In some preliminary discussions with developer consultants, we have found that we will have a great deal of difficulty in getting developer interest if the three cities don't work together as one. We need to be able to give a unified direction so that developers have confidence that their time and money are well spent. To get the most developer interest and make the most of this site, we are looking to form a guiding group, or steering committee, composed of stakeholders in our three cities. It may be a slow process, but we all agree a good process is necessary...and focus, patience and perseverance will likely be central to its success.

The Art in R-Park scavenger hunt will take place Saturday, October 5, from 10:00 -11:30 am following the SMA Run. The adventure to find pieces of art in Roeland Park begins at City Hall. Northwest Roe and Johnson

We are very excited to add Commerce Bank as our newest Roeland Park business. Currently they are contracted with the City to start "vertical construction" by March of next year. In the past couple months, they have indicated a desire to move the location of their proposed building on the site closer to the intersection and add one or more other businesses to maximize their on-site traffic. The

Governing Body has briefly discussed and mentioned some interest in this due to the increased density shown for this site in the City's Comprehensive Plan. The Council and I have stressed the importance of the timeline in the existing agreement. Commerce's proposal must be taken to the Redevelopment Committee and Planning Commission if they make any changes to the original plan. Council also expressed their concern to have a buffer to the existing residential neighborhood to the west and north of the property.

So... thank you for your inquiries. We look forward to more progress soon on our south gateway of Roeland Park.

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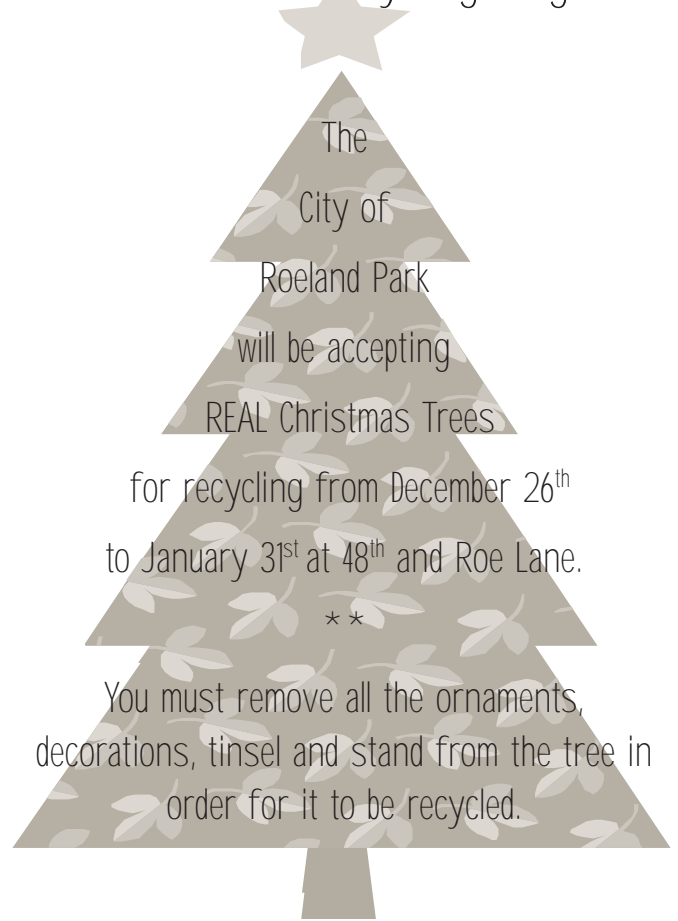
