



COVID-19 VACCINE DISTRIBUTION

In recent months, multiple vaccines have been approved by the US Food and Drug Administration to combat the novel coronavirus instigated by the COVID-19 pandemic. The Federal Government started the distribution of the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines, and on December 14, 2020, Kansas Governor Laura Kelly announced that the first shipment of the Pfizer vaccine arrived.

As more vaccine shipments arrive, Governor Kelly has released the vaccination distribution order which is split into 5 main phases. The vaccine distribution order prioritizes frontline healthcare workers, and those living and working in senior care facilities. Kansas is currently in Phase 2 of vaccine distribution as of January 21st. This includes those 65 years of age and older, those living in congregant settings (group homes, fire fighters, shelters, and the like), high contact critical workers essential to the pandemic response and those not vaccinated who were eligible during Phase 1.

Remembering George Schlegel

The Arts Advisory Committee of Roeland Park would like to acknowledge the passing of our beloved Art Commissioner George Schlegel. He was the essence of someone who lived and breathed art. Even when he was ill, he talked about how art could enhance our city. The George Schlegel Art Gallery was named in recognition of the countless years he has been involved in promoting art in our community.

George was instrumental in the development of the Art in R Park program. The program placed numerous works of art around the City. Some of the art received national attention. He also helped in the development of Granada Park.

George loved talking with people and displaying his knowledge of art. When anyone mentioned something about art, you can bet George had a story to go with it. He was always in his element at his gallery. For 20 plus years he made sure the gallery was filled with beautiful art. George searched for artists and worked with them at his gallery to display their art in the most aesthetic way. Even after displaying their art he continued to promote their art. Many artists have acknowledged how George either helped start their career or enhance it. His dedication to our community was outstanding. He was a lifelong learner and always searched out new ways to implement art in our city.

George will always be known as the Art Commissioner of Roeland Park.

The following quote is by Bruce Coville:

“Nothing you love is lost. Not really. Things, people—they always go away, sooner or later. You can’t hold them anymore than you can hold moonlight. But if they’ve touched you, if they’re inside you, then they’re still yours. The only things you ever really have are the ones you hold inside your heart.”

George deeply touched us and will forever be in our hearts.

The City Steps Forward on Climate Action

Fighting climate change is everyone's responsibility and the City of Roeland Park has taken measures to reduce its carbon footprint to ensure a sustainable future. In 2020, the City Council approved the purchase and implementation of Dynamhex, which will help the city measure its greenhouse gas emissions for the entire community, set nuanced reduction targets and track progress by engaging the local citizens for climate ac-

tion. Dynamhex will help the City keep track of citywide carbon emissions and residents can also use it to see the estimated emissions from their own home and learn how to reduce their personal footprint. R Park Phases 1 and 2 Now Complete

The Roeland Park City Council adopted the R Park Master Plan in 2017. The Master Plan evolved to the Phased Development Plan which illustrated improvements in 3 phases. The City completed the first two phases in fall 2020 which includes the new Gretchen & Ardie Davis Community Pavilion with fire-place, built-in grill, stone wall with pergola, and performance stage, a new accessible restroom, improved parking accessibility, a new soccer field and landscaping.

The City is grateful for the citizens who supported this endeavor, particularly the Citizens' Fundraising Initiative for R Park, Parks & Trees, Arts and Sustainability Committees, George Knipp, Jan Duncan, and everyone else who contributed their time and energy. 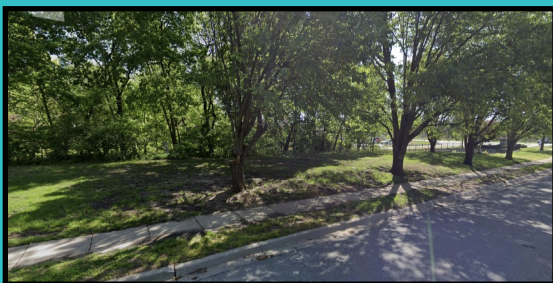
Restoring Cooper Creek Park

In 2021, Roeland Park will embark on a plan to revitalize Cooper Creek Park, which stretches some 900 feet along the creek between Roeland Drive and Ash Drive. Home to more than 300 trees and a variety of wildlife, the park is overrun with invasive species and in dire need of habitat restoration. As a gateway to our city, it also needs a makeover.

The Cooper Creek Park Restoration Project is led by Councilmember Trisha Brauer in cooperation with Parks Superintendent Tony Nichols, the Parks Committee, the Arts Committee, the Sustainability Committee, and local citizens.



The eradication of invasive species will be carried out by a professional landscaper specializing in habitat restoration, likely in September of 2021. Ultimately, the creek banks will be replanted with native trees, shrubs, grasses and flowering perennials.

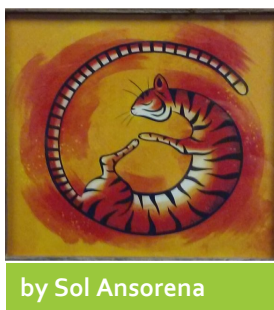
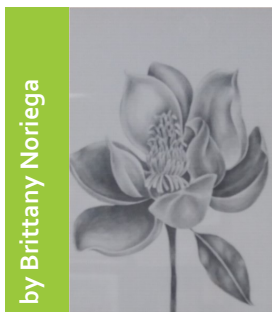

They serve approximately 100,000 students annually, providing access to music programming, theater and fine arts to youth in our area, and for many it is their first experience in the arts.

The online art auction, put together by Brittany Noriega, the newest member of the Arts Committee, featured artwork from over 20 local creators. The auction included paintings, prints, encaustic, and original photographs. The committee also used items that were previously donated to put together raffle baskets. Each item was handmade by local creators and included candles, jewelry, clothing items, engraved accessories and handmade cards.



The auction was held virtually at the end of November and raised \$1,022 for Kansas City Young Audiences.
