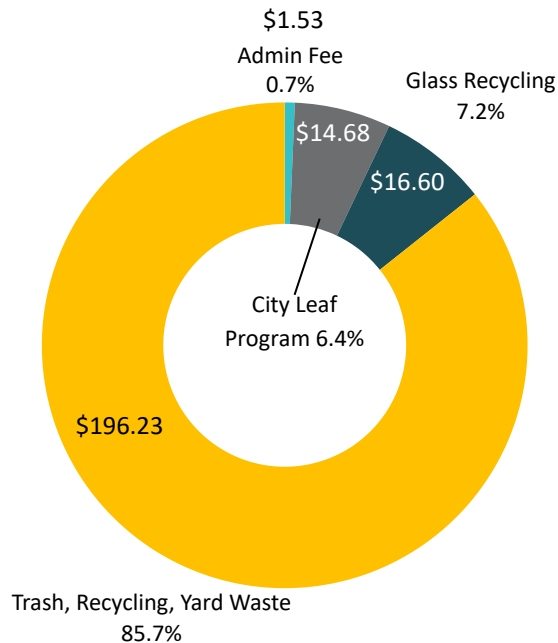
Q: What's the best part of being the building inspector so far?

Each single family/duplex property in Roeland Park is assessed \$229.05 per year for weekly trash, recycling, leaf collection, and curbside glass collection in 2024. While the \$229.05 fee shows up on resident's property tax bills every year, the City's actual annual cost is \$250.04 per property. To the left is a breakdown of those fees by program.



"Local Celeb" Ardie Davis Receives National Honors for Barbecue Prowess

Roeland Park resident Ardie Davis, aka Remus Powers, recently received a Lifetime Achievement Award at the Jack Daniels World Championship Invitational Barbecue Awards for 33 years of service to the Jack Daniels Barbecue competition. Ardie is no stranger to receiving national acclaim. In fact, he is the founder of the American Royal International BBQ Sauce, Rub and Baste Contest. He was also inducted into the Barbecue Hall of Fame in 2016 and has authored 11 books on grilling and smoking meat. Of course, in Roeland Park, he and his wife Gretchen are known for their contributions to making R Park the destination that it is today. In fact, the City named the Pavilion the Gretchen & Ardie Davis Community Pavilion in their honor.

THE BENEFITS OF EATING LOCAL

We've all heard of eating local, but what does it mean and why is it important? Put simply, it means purchasing food that was produced and harvested nearby, eliminating long-distance transportation and cutting out retail intermediaries. There are many benefits to eating locally produced food. Transporting food from producer to retailer to consumer burns fossil fuels, which releases CO2 into the atmosphere, contributing to the heating of the planet. Transporting food long distances requires more preservation, which can mean the addition of chemicals to your food. Moreover, local foods can be harvested at the peak of their ripeness, whereas foods that need to be transported great distances must be harvested early so as to not spoil before consumption. Ripe fruits and vegetables are more nutritious. Less handling from the farm to your table



means less opportunity for bacterial or viral contamination. Local farmers are also more likely to use organic and humane methods. You can even verify that by visiting the farm and meeting the farmers! Locally produced food is healthier, fresher, and tastes better. Purchasing local food is also an investment in your community. Shopping locally keeps your money in the local economy, sustaining your local farms, and creating more local jobs.

Where can you find local food in Kansas City? There are numerous farmers markets in the metro. CultivateKC has a good listing on their website at www.cultivatekc.org. You may also join a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program run by a local farm. That typically involves paying a yearly fee for a weekly box of fresh produce during the growing season. Urbavore Urban Farm (www.urbavorefarm.com) has a CSA program, but also takes orders on its website each week for local pick up on Thursday evenings at the farm, just seven miles east of Roeland Park. Urbavore also serves as a hub for other area farmers, so consumers can purchase a variety of foods (including meat, cheese, mushrooms,



fermented foods, tortillas, and more) from Urbavore's website and pick them up at Urbavore. It's a convenient option, particularly for those with schedule conflicts on Saturday mornings, when most farmers markets operate. Urbavore also runs

the local composting business, Compost Collective KC. You can drop your food scraps off at the farm when you go to pick up your food. For locally and ethically raised beef, pork, and lamb, check out Good Oak (www.agoodoak.com) and David's Pasture (www.davidspasture.com). For beef, Kansas Beef (www.kansasbeef.org) has a listing of farms by county and how to order. Sometimes it can feel impossible to make a positive impact as a consumer. Purchasing food from local farmers makes a huge impact for you, for them, and for our community.

According to a recent report from the US Small Business Administration between March 2021 and March 2022, 10,533 Kansas establishments opened and 8,004 closed, for a net increase of 2,529. Employment expanded at 20,215 establishments and contracted at 17,302. Small businesses accounted for 9,686 openings and for 7,462 closings. At the same time, there was a net increase of 34,758 jobs in Kansas. Small businesses contributed a net increase of 23,371 jobs, or 67.2 percent of that total. Attracting and retaining a skilled workforce is crucial for the success of any organization. A skilled workforce ensures that your business can operate efficiently, effectively and adapt to changing market demands. Project RISE is dedicated to providing you with the resources you need to build and maintain a skilled workforce. Workforce Partnership (workforcepartnership.com)

is committed to building a workforce development system that meets the needs of both job seekers and employers throughout the Kansas City area.
